The Elm Tree

During the recent storms that pounded the country. all within a week or so. a number of trees were bought down in and around the village. A large bough came down on the grounds of the hospital while a small tree partially fell onto the road just outside the hospital entrance. On Maypole Rd. opposite Manor Hall, a small dead elm lost its footing and has toppled along the line of the hedge and is currently being supported by a horse chestnut tree but nearer to home, close to the stables a series of small dead elms supporting a large outcrop of ivy have collapsed. This ivy was always a hive of activity in the autumn with bees and other pollinating insects

making the most of the nectar available. The ivv would have acted as a large sale and the dead elms were not able to withstand the forces conspiring against them. I planned to take a photo of the hedge material in the lane but by the time I got around to it the council had arrived and cleared the vegetation from the road leaving only the gap in the hedge. This can be seen in the first photo and that made me think that the elm tree or more specifically the English elm (Ulmus procera) would make a good subject for this month's article

The one abiding thought that comes to mind for somebody of my generation when discussing the elm tree is Dutch elm disease (DED). I'll return to DED a little later but first lets reflect on this tree's historic position in the British countryside. Five hundred years ago these trees were not common but in the 17th century landowners took a shine to them and used them to mark out field boundaries in hedges and within country estates where they often stood in regal isolation. This tree is tall and bold and very different to that other British arboreal standard barer: the English oak which is a solid, stout tree with a more generally rounded shape. Being such an 'English standard', it often appears in classic landscapes by painters such as Constable; see the attached image of Salisbury Cathedral.



One of this tree's quirks is that they were known to lose boughs for no apparent reason and boy scouts (never was one myself) were taught not to set up camp below them for this very reason. Boughs falling, and the associated damage that could cause may well be the reason the tree is traditionally associated with melancholy and





death. That, and the fact that elm was a favourite wood used in the making of coffins. This story line reminds me of an event that occurred when I was hiking in Oregon about twenty vears ago. It was late afternoon and the weather was fine with no wind and I was hiking through a clearing in a forested area when a huge rotted redwood a few hundred vards in front of me made a loud cracking noise and fell to the ground across my intended path. At that point I remembered the story of the boy scouts and camped well away from any tall trees that night!

So, back to DED. This disease is caused by a fungus that is passed from tree to tree primarily by the elm bark beetle although

other species also play a role The disease is thought to be of Asian origin and was first identified in Holland in the early 20th century. Some species of elm (but not the English elm) have bark that is distasteful to the beetles and this is an effective defence. The disease progresses due to the tree reacting to the fungus by blocking its own moisture and nutrient distribution system with gum but this in effect starves the tree to death. The disease itself. like Covid, is not one variant and early versions that arrived in the early 20th century only killed a small proportion of trees. In the early 60s it is thought that a shipment of wood from Canada arrived with a more virulent strain and consequently 250 million

trees died during the following decades changing the English landscape for, at best, centuries. As mature trees primarily generate elm seeds this source of new elms is limited. However, elms also propagate by the roots sending up suckers and these new elms tend to remain free of beetles. until they reach a height of 4 or 5m. Clipped elms in hedges however appear to have remained healthy for the full duration of the DED pandemic. Interestingly. one of the best places to see elms in Britain is around the Brighton area where elms may have been protected by the sea to the south and the chiefly tree free South Downs to the north. That. combined with the efforts of the local authorities to identify and destroy all trees showing signs of this disease. Further afield, cities in Holland physically vaccinate trees annually to radically reduce the number of cases although this can only be a realistic approach for a limited number of trees that have symbolic or ornamental meaning.

The grass for hay is coming along ok but could do with some You may have heard about farms being planted with trees for carbon sequestration. Don't want to get into the politics of the future of farming but we continue to look at what we can do sustainably. The direct drilling is definitely beneficial and as I said before we hope to plant clover into the grass in autumn as this is a legume which extracts





nitrogen out of the air and also works as a fertiliser. We are too small a farm to apply many new initiatives but will continue as best as we can.

I know I have quoted this

weather saying before but I think it is great. The early appearance of frogspawn indicates a mild spring and early summer - suitable weather for tadpoles. The position of frogspawn on a pond is also significant. If the spawn is in a sheltered spot near the edge, a wet and and windy spring is expected. If it is out in the middle, it indicates a dry spring and early summer. It appears that frogs choose deep water for safety when they sense impeding drought. Not sure how the saying can be applied when I found frogspawn in my watering can!

Bromley Green Hub & Library of Things Opens

'The Hub' from Greener and Cleaner Coming to Bromley's The Glades The Hub from Greener and Cleaner, hosting a Library of Things, is

coming to The Glades in Bromley. Founded by Greener and Cleaner, a local volunteer-run charity, the communitypowered hub will be an

exciting and engaging space for people to come and learn more about how they can help protect our environment. The





Library of Things will also help Bromley residents to save and reduce waste by affordably renting out useful items like carpet cleaners, sound systems and sewing machines.

Thanks to funding from **Bromley Council and** support from local charity Greener and Cleaner, Bromley's Library of Things will offer over 30 useful household, DIY and gardening items for residents to borrow for as little as a few pounds per day. Residents will be able to reserve items online ready to collect from a self-service kiosk in the Hub, at The Glades shopping centre in Bromley, a short walk away from Bromley South Station.

The Glades is at the heart of the Bromley ecosystem and is committed to their role in helping Bromley become greener and more biodiverse by being zero to landfill and working towards their long-term goal to be carbon neutral by 2030. In 2019 they made use of a previously disused area to create their Green Roof which received a Green Apple award and won The BIG Biodiversity Challenge in 2021.

Staffed by Greener and Cleaner volunteers, the Hub will also be used to host events, workshops, talks and local meet-ups. encouraging people to share practical skills like DIY and repair with others in the community. The Hub will be a vibrant community space where people can learn new skills, find information and advice, and borrow things to encourage a sharing economy.

Greener and Cleaner was

founded by Parisa Wright to facilitate community engagement and local action in response to the climate crisis. Becoming a charity in 2021, this is their first Green Hub to launch, the organisation hopes it will become a Blueprint for other shopping centres and high streets.

Parisa said:

"We strongly believe that everyone doing one small thing, however imperfectly, is better than no one doing anything, and we want to create a space where everyone feels encouraged and supported to take a small step towards a greener lifestyle. And we know that receiving information from people who are on the same journey is often more impactful than words from those in power."

Library of Things was founded by Emma Shaw, Rebecca Trevalyan and Sophia Wyatt in 2016. Inspired by similar projects emerging in cities like Berlin and Toronto, this women-led social enterprise launched its first self-service kiosk in Crystal Palace in 2018.

Library of Things is now





open in five locations across London. Over 5,000 people have now borrowed items over 10,000 times, preventing approximately 40 tonnes of items from becoming waste and 88 tonnes of CO2 emissions. Through its partnerships with product manufacturers Bosh, Kärcher and STIHL, councils and community groups, Library of Things is creating an alternative 'circular economy' helping to transform neighbourhoods into lowwaste, communitypowered hubs. Emma Shaw said:

"We've had lots of interest in Library of Things from Bromley residents and organisations – so we're

excited that they'll soon be able to borrow quality items like Bosch drills, Kärcher pressure washers and STIHL hedge trimmers for a few pounds per day. This is an important step for Library of Things, as we expand our work to create a community-led circular economy in neighbourhoods across London."


Keen to support residents in leading more sustainable lifestyles, facilitating area-wide emissions reductions and addressing climate change, Bromley Council is funding the initial setup costs for the Library of Things, within the Hub.

Councillor William

Huntington-Thresher, Executive Councillor for Environment said, "We are very pleased to provide the initial funding for The Library of Things in Bromley and are excited about the impact it could make. For those of us who realistically only use a drill and other household items on rare occasions: it will avoid the expensive need to purchase the item and crucially lessen the environmental impact of unnecessarily manufacturing and transporting them too. Many of the household items which will be available to hire would previously need to be purchased, with the item then taking up much needed space in our homes, deteriorating unused and eventually being thrown away. This wasteful approach to resource use has a detrimental environmental impact and is an approach we are keen to assist residents in moving away from."

You'll find the Greener and Cleaner Hub, with the Library of Things kiosk inside, at The Glades Shopping Centre with step free access, and ample parking for transporting bulky items.



Local History Group - Orpington's Big Moment in Politics

Sixty years ago, on 14 March 1962, Orpington left an indelible mark on the political landscape. Eric Lubbock, the 33 vear-old Liberal local councillor whose family had owned the High Elms estate at Farnborough since 1808, was propelled into parliament as Orpington's MP. having captured the trueblue constituency from the Conservatives with a sensational by-election victory.

That event still resounds today and Lubbock (who later became Lord Avebury and died in 2016 at the age of 87) will forever be remembered as "Orpington Man" who overturned a 15,000 Tory majority to take the seat by a margin of 8,000 votes, a massive swing for those days of 22%. By-elections now tend to be far more volatile and swings can be greater. Incredibly, over 80% of Orpington's electors turned out that chilly day in 1962 to put their Xs on their ballot papers, and Lubbock took 52.9% of all the votes cast. In comparison, the byelection won by the Lib-



Dems at Chesham and Amersham in June 2021 recorded a swing of 25.2% on a turnout of just under 52% while at North Shropshire in December, also taken by the Lib-Dems, the swing was 34.2% and turnout 46%. At Birmingham Erdington on 3 March this year, Labour held the seat on a meagre turnout of 27% — only 17,000 people bothering to vote.

Lubbock's Orpington victory was the first time since 1935 that the Liberals had won a seat in the London suburbs. It gave the party a grand total of seven MPs and the result was hailed as heralding a revival in the

Liberals' parliamentary fortunes – though that, of course, proved a false dawn.

Patrick Hellicar told the Chelsfield Local History Group's February meeting the story of "How Orpington shook the Political World" to mark the 60th anniversary of the event, revisiting a talk he gave in 2012 to the then very-much-smaller group on the 50th anniversary (reported over two editions of *Village Voice*, in April and May that year).

Flagged as "All the stuff you never knew about the Liberals' famous by-election victory of 1962", Patrick's February talk included some new information and illustrations as well as fresh anecdotes about the by-election campaign.

In the run-up to election day, dark elements emerged, including bigamy, suspected arson, shades of antisemitism in local hostility to the Tory candidate, and election posters being torn down almost as soon as they were fixed to trees and



fences. A planned threeway TV debate between the Conservative candidate Peter Goldman, Labour's Alan Jinkinson and Lubbock never happened because Lubbock refused to take part, claiming his views on nuclear disarmament had been misrepresented by Goldman.

Orpington was regarded as so important by the three parties that nationally-known political figures beat a path to the constituency to lend their support. Among them were the Liberal leader Jo Grimond, Mark Bonham-Carter and the rising Liberal star Jeremy Thorpe. George Brown

and Bessie Braddock showed their faces for Labour's man while lain McLeod and Enoch Powell stepped up for the Conservative candidate.

After the ballot closed at 9am on 14 March, the count was ground breaking – it was the first time TV cameras had ever been allowed to record such an occasion live. Watching from the TV studio, Jo Grimond was stunned when the voting figures were announced. "My God ... an incredible result," was his instant reaction.

Labour's George Brown, notoriously often seen drunk in public, was carried shoulder-high by Labour die-hards from Orpington Civic Hall, where the count had taken place. Despite their candidate having lost his deposit, Brown was clutching a beer bottle and defiantly singing "The Red Flag". Eric Lubbock, meanwhile, emerged triumphant on the shoulders of his cheering supporters. He, too, clutched a bottle. But his was a bottle of Champagne!

He and Orpington had made history.

Notes

- Every lay person whose name is entered on the Church Electoral Roll of the parish (and no other person) is entitled to vote at the election of parochial representatives of the laity.
- A person is qualified to be elected a parochial representative of the laity if:
 - (a) his or her name is entered on the Church Electoral Roll of the parish and, unless he or she is under 18, has been entered there for at least the preceding six months;
 - (b) he or she is an actual communicant (which means that he or she has received Communion according to the use of the Church of England or of a Church in communion with the Church of England at least three times during the twelve months preceding the date of the election);
 - (c) he or she is at least 16; and
 - (d) he or she is not disqualified as referred to in paragraph 3 of these Notes.
- (1) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a
 churchwarden or a member of a parochial church council, a district church council or a joint
 council if the person is disqualified from being a trustee of a charity (and the disqualification is
 not subject to a waiver which permits membership of a parochial church council, district
 church council or joint council).
 - (2) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person is included in a barred list (within the meaning of the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006).
 - (3) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council, a district church council, a joint council or a deanery synod if the person has been convicted of an offence mentioned in Schedule 1 to the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 (with that expression being construed in accordance with <u>Rule 71(2)</u> of the Church Representation Rules).
 - (4) A person's disqualification under sub-paragraph (3) may be waived by the bishop of the diocese by giving the person notice in writing.
 - (5) A person is disqualified from being nominated, chosen or elected or from serving as a member of a parochial church council if the person has been disqualified from holding office under section 10(6) of the Incumbent (Vacation of Benefices) Measure 1977.

Chelsfield Village Society - March Meeting Report

Committee members met in March in the Village Hall, we were joined by our Ward Councillors Mike Botting and Angela Page.

Bromley Trading Standards are highlighting tactics used by scammers who phone to tell you that your computer has been infected with a virus. They may use the names of well-known firms to appear official and say they can help to solve the problem.

Software firms do NOT make unsolicited calls to help fix computer problems.

Trick you into installing software - this could 'collect' personal details including usernames and passwords e.g. for banking and email

Charge you for software to remove viruses which could be obtained free of charge from legitimate companies

Guide you to fraudulent websites where you are asked to enter personal and financial information including credit/ debit card details



Persuade you to visit websites to download legitimate software that allows the scammers access and control of your computer from any location

Request credit card information and charge you for their services

Hang up immediately if you are called and asked to do any of the above

COVID Spring Boosters

Bromley will begin invitations for a second Covid booster for those over 75 and any immune-suppressed individual aged 12 and over.

Housebound residents will be scheduled to have this at home. The NHS will contact those who are eligible for a Spring Booster, so residents should wait until they are contacted.

The NHS will prioritise those whose clinical need is greatest, starting with those with a longer gap since their last dose.

Everyone eligible will be offered a top up between 3 and 6 months from their previous booster over
