The Dog Rose

The plant commonly known as the 'Dog Rose' (Rosa Canina) is a common hedgerow plant that flowers in June and July and is the ancestor

of all cultivated roses. The flowers are a lot less 'showy' than the cultivated variety but are a pretty pink which can vary between virtually white and dark pink while the stamen is yellow.

The flower was adopted by Henry the VII as his own personal symbol and in time was adopted by all British royalty and England itself. The symbol continues to be used today although

often the original dog rose is replaced by the cultivated variety such as its use by the England rugby tem.

Rupert Brooke, in his poem 'The Old Vicarage, Grantchester mentions the dog rose thus: Unkempt about those hedges blows, An English unofficial rose.

While the herbalist Gerard described the



dog rose 'the most principal place among all flowers whatsoever'.

In historic times this plant probably had greater significance than it does now as it had many medicinal uses. Its name 'Dog' suggests that it is of little use, or even worthless, but it is thought that it got this name due to its use as a cure for dog bites (possibly even rabies).

Its rose hips are particularly rich in vitamin C and during WWII were used to produce rose-hip syrup which is particularly tasty after the hips have been exposed to a few nights of frost (or nowadays, a night in the freezer). The syrup accompanies apples and ice cream particularly well.

I have a dog rose outside my back door and in the 25 years I have lived here cannot re-

member ever seeing birds feeding on the hips. In fact my 'Forager's handbook' tells me that birds and animals in Kent avoid the hips and so they can remain on the stem until the following spring. Why only Kent – I do not know!

Chelsfield Fair 14th July 2012

Olympic Cloud hits Spitfire...

The Fair on the 14th July is looking to be a great one but there is one significant irritation. You may have noticed that London's hosting of the Olympic Games seems to be out to interfere with every aspect of life and it has finally hit the seemingly Olympic-proof Chelsfield Fair. Special airspace restrictions are in force throughout the summer, beginning on the day of the Fair. This was known about and according to the published documentation, there seemed no earthly reason why we could not run our normal flying displays, especially as the Olympic events do not start for another couple of weeks. According to the blurb, there was some additional admin and a bit more security but once you'd filed a flight plan you were good to go.

Our Spitfire pilot, Dan Griffith, has consulted with Air Traffic and it seems that an additional unpublished restriction is being put in place, meaning that flight plans will only be granted to aircraft transiting from A to B and will not be granted for what they call 'stationary' flights. A sta-

tionary flight is one where the aircraft remains in one small area for a length of time, i.e. a flying display. The bad news is that this pretty much precludes us having our wonderful Spitfire display this year. Quite how an aircraft displaying four miles from an airfield and returning there afterwards poses any more of a security risk than one flying

to another airfield is beyond me. If anyone can explain, I'll be in the pub drowning the Fair's collective sorrows.

We're still talking with the powers that be, but it's looking a bit unlikely. Never mind – next year!

The good news is that, at the moment, the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight are confident that they will still be able to display the Dakota at the Fair (probably because the aircraft belongs to the Queen!) so we should still be able to provide you with unique aerial entertainment in the heart of the village. It will be a longer display than the one in 2007 so it should make up for the lack of Spitfire; can you please cross your fingers for us, whenever vou have a minute, just to be on the safe side.

Minerals & Waste Development - Formal Notice

Formal Notice of the Preparation of Kent County Council's Minerals and Waste Local Plan

-Mineral Sites Plan 'Preferred Options' Stage Consultation, and -Waste Sites Plan 'Preferred Options' Stage Consultation

Kent County Council is part way through the process of preparing new Minerals and Waste Local Plans. The final framework will be in three parts – The Minerals and Waste Plan (formerly called the Core Strategy), a Mineral Sites Plan and a Waste Sites Plan.

This is to notify you and invite you to join the consultation on the current versions of the documents, which are at an important stage in their preparation.

You are invited to give us your views on: what these documents should contain; the proposed preferred option sites for minerals extraction and supply and waste management; the sites not selected as preferred options:

preferred options: the evidence base that has been prepared to inform the plans (including the draft Local Aggregate Assessment. the Waste Needs Assessment update, the accompanying Interim Sustainability Appraisal, the Habitat Regulations Assessment, the Strategic Flood Risk Assessments and details explaining how the site assessment process was carried out).

The Mineral Sites and the Waste Sites Plans consultation at this 'preferred options' stage is the second time we have asked for your

views in the process of preparing these plans. The responses from the 2011 site plans consultations at 'options' stage have assisted us in the site assessment and selection process, and are saved as part of the evidence base. Both documents now identify the sites that are considered to be the best and most sustainable sites needed by Kent for minerals and waste management up to the end of 2030. There are now 25 preferred option sites for mineral supply and 21 preferred option sites for waste management. The remaining sites are identified as 'not allocated' sites.

We would like your views on these preferred options. The responses received from this second round of consultations will help us with the preparation of the final plans.



These consultations close at 5pm on Monday 23 July 2012.

Weight Loss Support Unit Launches at CPH

A support group for men and women who have undergone bariatric (weight loss) surgery has been launched by staff at BMI Chelsfield Park in

Orpington. The Bariatric Support Group, set up by the hospital's Lead Bariatric Nurse Sheila Abadiano, aims to provide advice, emotional support

and education for anyone who has undergone or is looking at bariatric surgery.

Obesity is on the in-



crease and last vear the number weight loss operations performed in the UK rose by 70 per while the overall number of people admitted to hospital because of obesity rose, by 30 per cent. "Obesity has become a major health concern here in the UK and for some people, dieting, exercise and medication just aren't enough to bring down their weight to a safe and lasting level." commented Lead Bariatric Nurse Sheila Abadiano. "It is a common misconception that surgery is the easy option, it isn't. Patients who undergo weight loss surgery have to break both their physical and mental addiction to food. Unlike other addictions, where users give up their vice, food remains a necessity and patients have to completely readdress the relationship they have with it. It is this that makes the postoperative care as important as the initial operation. Being able to speak with patients, who have been on the same journey as you, is vitally important and this group allows our patients to interact and share their tips

and experiences."

The Weight Loss Support Group enables patients to meet and discuss the issues they face, share information, meet friends and overcome difficulties. The group also promotes social interaction and



members can draw on the experience of people in similar situations. With the help of clinicians, dietitians and nurses, such as Sheila, who specialise in bariatric care and the treatment of metabolic conditions. Through the group members can take appropriate steps towards a healthier lifestyle in a managed and supported way.

Speaking on the launch of the support group Mr Shamsi El-Hasani, Consultant Bariatric Surgeon at Chelsfield Park Hospital, commented, "Obesity is not only a condition in itself but carries other health risks including diabetes, hypertension. stroke, arthritis, cancer of the ovary and colon. sleep apnoea and gallstones. Bariatric surgery offers the answer for some people, when diet. exercise or medications fail to achieve a lasting loss of weight. Our patients have taken the positive step to help improve their life. The surgery not only lowers weight but reduces diabetes in 85 per cent of patients, hypertension in 75 per cent, sleep apnoea in 90 per cent, and infertility in 50 per cent. It can also help to restore life expectancy. I commend Sheila for her dedication to our patients and would encourage everyone who ahs undergone or is considering weight loss surgery to attend these groups, share advice and met with people who are going through the changes required to live a healthier, happier life."



The Bariatric Support Group, which is open to both private and NHS patients, will meet every on the second Friday of every month at Chelsfield Park Hospital and will provide an environment for people to exchange ideas, coping strategies and current treatment information.
