# The Bluebell

The well known bluebell (Hyacinthoides nonscriptus) at this time of year can be found in great profusion in most shady areas with a particular liking for ancient woodlands where the early leaves offer some ise that 25% - 50% of all of the 'non-scritus' sub species occur in the British isles. They can also be found naturally on the Atlantic coast from Portugal to the Netherlands but nowhere else in the numbers that make a plant before 1548 when William Turner refers to them as 'Crowtoes' and says that their bulbs were used to make glue and could be used to stiffen the ruffs worn in Elizabethan times. The most common colour



shade from the sun. We, the British, acknowledge the beauty of the woods carpetted in these flowers (just take a look at the photo below which is credited to Ashley Dace and was taken in Norfolk). However, few realwoodland scene in Britain so special in May. In fact the ancient Mediterranean Greeks and Romans appear to have been unaware of this plant. Rather more strangely, English herbalists did not mention this is obviously blue. However, occasional white variants can be found and these seem to find their way into domesticated gardens. Even rarer however is the pink 'bluebell'. In fact I only consciously became aware of my first pink bluebell a few weeks ago !

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In addition to the native bluebell, a Spanish variant (Hyacinthoides Hispanica) is moving into the old strongholds and either replacing or creating a hybrid (Hyacinthoides x massartiana). Campaigns over recent years have tried to eradicate these newcomers but most people have trouble identifying the Spanish invaders and as picking the natural variant is illegal, most leave well alone.

So, the easiest way of identifying the two apart is from the pollen. Inspecting a newly opened flower, the pollen of the native species is a creamy-white colour. The Spanish or hybrid will have a green or blue colour. The native also has a far stronger sweet smell, a narrow tubular flower with strongly rolled back petals and the tip of the stem will be nodding. Having the two (or three) side by side makes life easier but it is not always straightforward to tell them apart.

So, if you have not yet been up to the woods this year, now would be a very good time to view the bluebells in all their glory, but do try to avoid walking on them – difficult as that is !

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## Local Geophysical Survey

Many of you will be aware of the Geophysical study that has been undertaken in our area recently. A company TES-LA, has been undertaking a study in Kent for the company Northdowns Energy Ltd, looking for gas and oil strata in the ground beneath us. A large vehicle, like the one below, travels slowly along the route, every so



often lowering a large pad onto the road surface and vibrating the ground. These vibrations are then picked up with a string of detectors every half metre or so along miles of cable. Talking to the teams, they have been looking for evidence of the oil/gas field along the north downs that has been found so far elsewhere in the Reigate area. The vibrations produced by the vehicle are quite strong, and some householders have found their house being shaken with some minor damage! When asked, the team said that gas strata had been found

## **Green Street Green Parking - 10p Minimum**

You may be aware that new and different parking restrictions have appeared around Green St Green - incl. Pay & Display in the High Street at 50p per hour. A straw poll of G St G residents (along with some emails from shoppers) revealed that most people thought Pay & Display at 50p per hour meant a minimum of 50p - which may seem high for a low value convenience shop.

Parkers may pay 10p for 12 minutes.

#### Background

The new parking arrangements are the result of a long campaign by local residents in and off Green St Green High Street who found that "their" spaces were taken by staff from Metrobus, Waitrose and the Police shop (their private cars). The changes include a mixture of new Yellow Lines, some removal of Yellow Lines together with some marked bays to tidy up parking.

Pay & Display should deter long-stay parkers hopefully enabling more shoppers to visit.

# The Village Fair 13th July - Update

As you can imagine preparations are in full swing for the Village Fair on Saturday 13th July. We've sold all the pitches. most of the entertainment is booked and we are now into the publicity phase. 15,000 flyers have been printed, 10,000 of which go out with the News Shopper two weeks before the Fair which is ironic considering Chelsfield Village has not received a copy of the News Shopper in living memory! Posters are also available in both A4 and A3 so if you are able to display a poster and maybe access to somewhere which could take some flyers, please contact me and I will arrange to get them to you.

As we raised a considerable sum for our 2012 (and 2013) headline charity, The Maypole Project last year despite a distinct lack of Fair we have decided this year to support an additional local charity, CASPA. CASPA run a day centre for autistic children and we hope that we can put a good few quid their way once the carnage of another Chelsfield Village Fair subsides.

As with other years we are keen to keep the roads flowing freely and to that end we will be prevailing upon the good nature of local residents who ordinarily park their cars on the major access roads into the village to move their cars into the temporary local residents' car park next to the Five Bells for the day of the Fair. The roads are narrow and get very busy so to keep tempers calm and avoid vehicle damage, we like to give the sometimes daft British public a nice wide gap to aim for. This year we would like Church Road, the village end of Skibbs Lane, Warren Road and Bucks Cross Road clear and we will be coning off these roads to prevent punters parking there too. If you are affected, you will be receiving notification of all the details nearer the time and we really do appreciate your co-operation for this one day of madness a year.

One slight disappointment is the postponement of tethered hot air balloon rides. On reflection, a 90 foot high balloon on a field already packed with stalls and thousands of people suddenly seems not quite the good idea it once did but we do hope to put on a special balloon day later in the year so you can all get a bird's eye view of your village.

Our fabulous flying displays are booked and we are still recruiting members for Chelsfield Flying Club. £50 gets you a T-Shirt and



a behind-the-scenes visit to the Biggin Hill Heritage Hangar where all the aircraft live and £100 or more additionally entitles you to actually sit in a Spitfire during that visit. The T-Shirt is available this year in a v-neck design for ladies if that helps persuade you! And remember that by joining you are helping pay the thousands of pounds it costs to bring



flying to Chelsfield.

Finally, artist Eddy Dodwell has yet again produced an original painting for auction for our Fair charities and local good causes. This is the third year on the trot that Eddy has made this generous gesture and the painting this year features the Hawker Hurricane due to display during the after-

noon over an imagined landscape which includes the stunning views of Lon-

don. St Martin-of-Tours and the John Ellis memorial on Chelsfield Aerodrome! The painting will be on display at the Information Point on the day but you can make bids by phone or email right now. The final auctions will take place at the end of the

afternoon at the Fair.

# **Red Kite Seen Over Chelsfield**

There have been sightings in May, of a red kite seen hunting over the Chelsfield area. These magnificent birds of prey are distinctive because of their forked tail

and striking colour predominantly chestnut red with white patches under the wings and a pale grey head. They have a wingspan of nearly two metres (about five-and-a-halffeet), but a relatively small body weight, making the bird very ag-

ile, and allowing it to stay in the air for many hours with hardly a beat of its winas.

Although common in the

past, the bird was perceived as a threat to expanding agriculture. And was persecuted to the extent that by the late 18th Century, Red Kites had

few pairs, but now a reintroduction scheme has brought them back to many parts of England and Scotland, and their numbers are increasing. They

are now quite commonly seen when traveling along the M4 or M40 through the Chilterns, and they are now being sighted as far away as Kent.

Red Kites are neither particularly strong nor aggressive despite being large birds. Primarily a scavenger Red Kites are however predators

and take a wide variety of live prev, ranging from earthworms to small mammals, amphibians and birds.

Professor Tony Kochhar, a Consultant Shoulder and Upper Limb Surgeon at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital in Orpington. has been shortlisted for a prestigious 2013 Independent Healthcare Award, The annual awards recognise outstanding quality and innovation in the independent healthcare sector and rewards teams and individuals whose dedication and commitment helps make the UK independent healthcare sector truly world-class.

Professor Kochhar was recognised in the Innovation category for his pioneering work in the field of upper limb orthopaedic treatments. A shoulder specialist, Professor Kochhar this year introduced a new surgical technique Comprehensive Arthroscopic Management (CAM) to treat osteoarthritis of the shoulder and delay the need for a shoulder replacement. Professor Kochhar was also recognised for his use of a new non-surgical technique, Platelet Rich Plasma

(PRP) therapy, which helps greatly accelerate recovery in patients following a tendon injury. Speaking on his award nomination Professor Kochhar commented: "It is a great honour to be recognised for my work in the field of orthopaedic shoulder techniques. It is essential that innovation in the healthcare sector be focused around the patient and their long term outcomes. Both of these procedures, CAM and PRP, help alleviate

the need for major surgery or intervention whilst also improving the recovery process for patients. Whilst both still relatively new to the UK the initial results and patient focused trials have proved extremely positive and I anticipate they will become the gold standard for shoulder techniques in the UK healthcare market."

Professor Kochhar will be honoured at The Independent Healthcare Awards Gala Dinner on 8 October 2013. Speaking on this year's nominations Ruth Hoadlev. Executive Director of BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital commented, "This nomination is fantastic recognition for BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital and Professor Kochhar. this recognition and extend our thanks for his dedication to improving the care and long term outcomes of his patients in our hospital."

#### Paul Rason introduced the meeting with a recording of a choir singing True Colours. He asked for suggestions as to who the choir was but nobody guessed that it was in fact the Bromlev and Orpington Rock Choir. Paul recently ioined the choir which belongs to a franchise of rock choirs throughout the country. They follow a proscribed course and repertoire under the direction of a trained tutor. Paul liked the idea that there are no auditions to join. The Bromley and Orpington aroup consists of 100 women and 4 men. The different voices learn their parts by downloading them from the Internet and preparing at home before rehearsals. The recording was done at the famous Abbey Road studios.

The rock choirs were recently allocated a slot at the Royal Festival Hall and combined with other choirs to sing 6 songs, attracting a large passing audience of around 400. AS the choirs are taught the same songs in the same way they can combine in performance without difficulty.

After the break for refreshments Paul told us about his involvement with recording the parish records of St Giles' Church, Farnborough. Using the facilities of **Bromley Local Studies** Library, Paul takes digital photographs of each page in the parish register then transcribes the information in a data base. Compulsory recording of parish records came into place in 1837 when the Poor Law required you to return to

the parish of your birth for support, making paper records important. Many births were registered at the local workhouses which were joined in a "union". Bromley union had 10 or 11 workhouses. Babies if single women were baptised by the chaplain rather than the vicar. The occupation of the fathers. if known, were recorded and ranged from hav binders to professors of music. The early records showed the traditional names but a few "non-saint" Christian names appeared in the records in later years. The marriage register showed that many marriages were between near neighbours. Paul has given copies of the records to St Giles' Church and the Local Studies Library.

# **Breast Cancer Expert Praises Angelina Jolie**

Breast cancer expert Mr Anil Desai, who practices at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital has praised Hollywood actress Angelina Jolie's decision to speak publicly about her double mastectomy.

Ms Jolie revealed she had undergone surgery this month following a positive result for the BRCA1 gene. In the UK around one in 400 women carry the gene mutation BRCA1 or BRCA2 which significantly increases the risk of breast or ovarian cancer. Ms Jolie had the test as her mother died aged 56. from ovarian cancer. Her decision to have a double mastectomy was reached after the test revealed she had an 87% lifetime risk of developing the disease.

Women who carry either of the BCRA genes have between a 45% and 90% lifetime risk of breast cancer, compared to the average lifetime risk of 1 in 8 or 12.5%. "Ms Jolie's decision to go public on her treatment has bought to the spotlight the issues surrounding a women's genetic risk of developing breast cancer," Mr Desai at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital commented. "It is important however, to put the risk into perspective and I would advise women not to panic. The risk of having the gene mutation is low and the genetic test need only be taken if there is a strong



family history of breast or ovarian cancer."

A positive result for either BRCA gene generally indicates that a woman has inherited a known harmful mutation and, therefore, has an increased risk of developing certain cancers - like breast and ovarian. However, a positive test result provides information only about a person's risk; it cannot tell whether an individual will actually develop cancer, or when. Not all women who inherit a harmful BRCA1 or BRCA2 mutation will develop breast or ovarian cancer.

"I praise Ms Jolie for her bravery in bringing this issue to the fore, but I would encourage women in Bromley to understand that the majority of women who develop breast cancer, or who have a relative with breast cancer. do not have a BRCA mutation, and will not need to consider having a preventative double mastectomy. Even if you do have a positive result, surgery is not the only option available. Increased surveillance with regular diagnostic tests can be an alternative option. But, it is important not to panic, less than 10% of all patients diagnosed with breast cancer have a family history of the disease. If you are worried about an increased risk, due to a family history, you should visit for GP for advice" Here Mr Desai looks generally at what the current National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) guidelines are for who should have a genetic test:

• The age your relatives were, when diagnosed with breast cancer (the younger they are, the more likely there is to be a faulty gene in the family)

• Whether anyone in your family had cancer in both breasts

• If there are men in your family who have had breast cancer

• If there is a history of ovarian cancer in the family

It is important to remember that the affected family members must be close, blood relatives of yours and must all be from the same side of the family (so either your mother or father's side).
