ORIENTEERING Is it for you? - Try it!

How do you loose weight without dieting, live longer, save money and keep the children happy at the weekend?

What is the miracle cure? Sport. Any sport will do. If you've not got one already why not try an accessible one such as Orienteering. Orienteering is an outdoor adventure sport. The aim is to navigate between control points marked on a map to complete the course in the quickest time. It does not matter how young, old or fit you are, as you can run, walk or jog the course and progress at your own pace.

The Kent Orienteering league is coming to Lullingstone Park on Saturday 18th April. Even if you know an area well, orienteering is a great way to discover hidden corners of our countryside..

Beginners can enter by

registering in the car park by the visitors centre between 11.00 and 12.00, Check our website www.dfok.co.uk for further details and any changes. Basic instruction and equipment are provided, no map reading experience is necessary. We suggest you email us at newcomers@dfok.co.uk before the event so we can help get you started. Alternatively just ask one of the officials on the day. The Kent Orienteering League is great for adults, juniors and families.

We are also opening a permanent orienteering course on the same day. We will leave markers in the woods for you to find whenever the park is open, though to really experience the sport you need to go to an organized event.

25 years drinking Homemade Wine
