### **Local History Group**

A full house met to hear Sue Short gave an illustrated talk on the trials and tribulations of producing her book, "Pratts Bottom", subtitled "A Journey Through Life".

In 1988 Sue and her husband bought a ruined cottage and three guarters of an acre in Pratts Bottom. The old Beech cottage was demolished as being beyond repair. having suffered a fire and consequently being in a poor state. The plot was cleared with many bonfires. This was illustrated with photographs. The house was rebuilt and after her husband's death in a road accident Sue continued with the project. She found an old postcard of the property which helped her in landscaping the garden. This encouraged her to research the history of the cottage.

Sue contacted Geoffrey Copus for information about the history and maps of the area and her interest expanded to include the history of Pratts Bottom. She sent questionnaires to the residents to collect as much information as possible

about the properties in the area. Reading through all the material she collected. Sue noticed how the field names often reflected the soil type or aeology of the area. She has tried to produce the history of each house. Charts at the back of the book include census records and school records. People were very generous lending hundreds of photographs to be copied. As the amount of information grew Sue compiled it into a large format prototype book which showed the photographs to best effect. However in retrospect she confesses that she made a mistake in not finding a publisher first and preparing the book to their specification. She eventually found a publisher in Sevenoaks who informed her that the public would prefer a smaller format more easily handleable book. Sue is disappointed that the photos are smaller than she would wish.

Sue said her second mistake was to announce the book launch with no books ready for sale, so to start with she was giving talks with nothing to sell. Proof reading was carried out in a rush by family, friends and neighbours, much of it via the Internet with distant members of the family. When the books finally arrived 200 were sold in the first 2 hours. The book is now in its second printing with the original errors corrected.

The village shop in Pratts Bottom sells copies of the book.

Would she do it again? Probably not, she says, as it took over her life for 4 years.

After the refreshment break Sue went on to show us some of the many photographs she has collected. Among these were photographs of Birthday Woods, the restoration of 17<sup>th</sup> century Pear Tree Cottage, a splendid hunting scene in front of the Bull's Head, Osgood's Carriage Works and shop, a mammoth tooth found in a field behind the Bull's Head, the several incarnations of the Post Office (now defunct), the Clock Garage (now the Esso Garage), the village fete,



school, scouts, home guard etc. Everyone seems to love looking at old photographs of the locality, and the audience could have looked at the photos for hours! Not having known much about the area previously we were inspired to walk to Pratts Bottom via the footpath next to Pecks Cottages, Church Road. The walk was enjoyable despite a couple of stiles of Everest like proportions, lots of sticky mud and a blizzard on the return route at Broke Hill golf course!

#### The Right Place at The Right Time?



#### A History of Chelsfield Post Office (continued from January Issue)

A few months after the incident (the attempted robbery reported in the last episode) Pauline and Wins courage and resolution to protect Post Office property was rewarded in a special ceremony for the occasion which was held at GPO Headquarters in London on Tuesday, 19th March 1968. Both Pauline and Win were presented with bravery awards personally by the then Postmaster General. Mr. Edward Short. Pauline was presented with £50.00 and an engraved purse and Win received £15.00 and an engraved purse. Mr. Short said that the Post Office were honoured to have such women with

them and were proud of them for what they had done. He described both women as courageous and such actions as a deterrent to would-be intruders. Following the presentations Pauline and Win were shown over GPO Headquarters and then taken out to lunch at the Post Office Tower, Pauline's son David was also at the presentation ceremony to see his mother and Win Lambert honoured.

Even now after many years have gone by, this incident is still remembered by those who lived in Chelsfield or had connections with the Post Office at that time. Only recently I happened to be talking to a man who was a retired postman who used to deliver around Chelsfield and Well Hill. He brought up the subject of the robbery at Chelsfield Village Post Office which goes to show the gravity of what occurred on that day even in the light of events in today's much more violent society.

I feel that I cannot pass by mentioning another very serious attempted robbery at the Chelsfield Village Office that took place on 31st July, 1971. At the end of that day Pauline and Pat were totalling up cash in the Office to make the books up, when two men



entered. One of the men was holding a knife and proceeded to try and open the date leading behind the counter from the customer side of the shop. Pauline went to the back of the shop with the intention of fetching her two Alsatian dogs and when she returned the two men had fled. Luckily, an off-duty policeman saw the men making their escape in a car and about an hour later the two men plus an accomplice were apprehended. At first all three men denied, any knowledge of the incident but later they admitted their involvement. The motive for the robberv was an attempt to recoup money that two of the men had lost the night before whilst playing cards. The three men who all came from the Eltham area subsequently appeared in Court at The Old Bailey and were put on probation for two years.

The Post Office was still as busy as ever when the year 1980 arrived. This year heralded another happy period in Pauline Lambert's life as she married for a second time and decided to move with her husband to nearby Knockholt. At this point Pauline made it known that she wished to relinquish her job as Post Mistress at Chelsfield, but in no way could she have anticipated that the Post Office Management would then announce that the Village Office would close permanently at the end of 1980 Despite a most vociferous and energetic campaign (including a well supported petition) it did not prove possible to persuade the Post Office to change its mind. Looking back Pauline wondered whether the closure would have happened if she had decided not to have got married. Personally, I think that it must have already been planned to occur at some point and Pauline's wedding and move from Cross House was a very good excuse to put the plan into action. If the Post Office Management really wanted to retain the Chelsfield Village Office I am sure that it would have been kept open It would not have been the same of course. without Pauline behind the counter but Post Office life in Chelsfield Village would have continued to flourish. As it turned out, however, once shut it has remained that way since 1980 although Pauline's family -David, Mary and their family - still live at Cross House. Years later Pauline was still to be seen in the Village taking her beloved Alsatian dog

"Lucky" for long, daily walks in the locality.

When the Post Office closed Mrs. Pat Whitehead was re-located to work at the Office in Court Road (part of the Home & Garden store) where she worked behind the counter for a further 12 years as a much valued colleague of Mr. and Mrs. Khambalia. After Pat's health deteriorated badly she moved to a nursing home near her son in Cheltenham.

After such an enduring presence in Chelsfield Village and with such a distinguished history I feel that the best word for the closure of the Village Post Office is tragic. I realise that after such a. long interval there is no prospect whatsoever of the return of the Chelsfield Village Office. However, I do hope that my account of what has gone before will ensure that this aspect of our Village life will never be lost or forgotten.

I am very proud to own them, I do still use them from time to time to weigh something quickly but only as a rough guide, they are not so accurate these days but mostly they sit there governing my work top and remaining to be looked at and enjoyed by me, my family and friends.

### Six Helpful Tips for Cold Weather Drivers

#### The Village Voice has not tested any of these so use them at your own risk!

With any luck we have seen the last of the ice and snow, if so save this list for next year.

1.Keep your headlights clear with car wax! Just wipe ordinary car wax on your headlights. It contains special water repellents that will prevent that messy mixture from accumulating on your lights - lasts 6 weeks.

2. Squeak-proof your wipers with rubbing alcohol! Wipe the wipers with a cloth saturated with rubbing alcohol or ammonia. This one trick can make badly streaking & squeaking wipers change to near perfect silence & clarity.

**3.** Ice-proof your windows with vinegar! Frost on its way? Just fill a spray bottle with three parts vinegar to one part water & spritz it on all your windows at night.

In the morning, they'll be clear of icy mess. Vinegar contains acetic acid, which raises the melting point of water---preventing water from freezing!

**4.** Prevent car doors from freezing shut with cooking spray! Spritz cooking oil

on the rubber seals around car doors & rub it in with a paper towel. The cooking spray prevents water from melting into the rubber.

5. Fog-proof your windshield with shaving cream! Spray some shaving cream on the inside of your windshield & wipe if off with paper towels. Shaving cream has many of the same ingredients found in commercial defoggers.

6. De-ice your lock in seconds with hand sanitizer! Just put some hand sanitizer gel on the key & the lock & the problems solved!

#### ...and Another Six (tongue in cheek) for an Icy Crisis

1)Don't worry if power goes off - air outside colder than in freezer so leave door open.

2)Build up stockpile of north sea gas by inflating hundreds of kids balloons. Keep away from holly and naked flames.

3)Strap a hedgehog to each boot for better grip.

Emergency food:

4)When all else exhausted - pond fish, half a fox, next

# **Bromley Street Pastors**

"What's a Street Pastor?" The question comes in different forms. Sometimes it is "What's a Street Pasta?" I have even been asked "What's a Street Pester?" However the question is phrased, we seek to respond with good humour.

Street Pastors are all volunteers from local churches. They go through a selection process which involves taking up references from their church minister and one other person. They undergo twelve Saturdays of training spread over a period of five months.

As well as practical instruction on how to handle different situations on the Streets, they receive training in drug awareness, counselling, sociology and introductions to how various statutory services operate: social services, probation, police and youth provision.

Street Pastors have a distinctive uniform which

creates an identity that people come to recognise. Being in uniform, people readily accept us approaching them & talking with them.

So what is it we are aiming to do?

► to be a caring presence on the streets,

► to offer support, encouragement and practical help,

► to foster good will and a sense of safe community,

► and to gain a better understanding of the local community that as churches we seek to serve.

In churches, we have considerable experience of caring for a wide variety of people and building caring communities. As Street Pastors we seek to take that caring ethos of the church onto our streets and help build a sense of caring community.

Our motivation in this comes from wanting to

follow the example and teaching of Jesus. It was said of Jesus that he went about doing good and bringing wholeness into peoples lives. Many people are familiar with the term 'good Samaritan', but few realise that it comes from the teaching of Jesus about what it means to be a good neighbour.

We are not there to preach to people but to care for people. Of course we will, when asked, talk about our faith because we do believe that an active Christian faith and involvement in a church community is a great benefit.

Street Pastors teams operate on Friday evenings in Bromley town, Orpington and Beckenham. Around the country there are some 3500 Street Pastors in about 130 different locations and new areas starting up every month.
