The Jackdaw

Last month my piece (reproduced here) somehow got lost on the information superhighway and didn't make it to the editors desk. Maybe it became cyber roadkill. But here it is now.

As I write this in mid-January, last night's overnight low temperature reached about -7°C according to my garden thermometer. It always amazes me that such delicate animals as small garden birds can survive such bone chilling temperatures! Some of these birds (wrens for instance) weigh little more than a twenty pence coin meaning they can lose their body heat very quickly if it were not for their coat of feathers. We can feed them but as the sun goes down they need to find somewhere to roost, tuck their heads under their wings and just sit out up to 16 hours of nightfall. No respite for them. A week of sub-zero temperatures means somehow staying warm for a week on a diet of difficult to find insects and stale bread donated by garden owners! Due to

the cold they need to eat more on a winter's day than they do at any other time of year and this is just when food is at its most difficult to find. I remember the winter of 62/63 which is reputed to have been the coldest for 200 years. Once the show melted our garden was littered with dead birds that had either died of starvation or exposure.

On the subject of roosting, I remember when I had a camera in a bird box mounted on my shed. One very cold winter evening a blue tit decided to take shelter within and was just settling down when another blue tit entered and tried to share. The first fought it off as if its

life depended on it. Not the cleverest move as two would have been warmer than one!

This month I'm going to be writing about the Jackdaw (Corvus monedula - Western or Eurasian Jackdaw). This bird is the smallest of the corvids and are somewhat dove like in body shape. Although similar to crows and rooks in having black plumage it is different in having a grey hood around the back of the head and small creamy serpent-like eves which are distinctly unlike other corvids. Older jackdaws have been known to develop grev plumage across their entire bodies. Like other corvids these





birds are gregarious and have a range of calls but the most distinctive is an almost dog-like 'Jack' yap. The jackdaw has a number of regional names including: Jackie midlands. Caddow/Caddy East Anglia and Chaw Cornwall, There is some historic confusion with the jackdaw's name. In the 14th century it appears to have been called by various corruptions of the name 'chough' which nowadays refers to the 'red billed chough'. Yet Shakespeare used the name in both King Lear and Midsummer nights dream and it is unclear which species he intended. And talking of species, there is some argument that this bird should be a member of the corvid subgroup Coloeus. Only two species sit in this group: the Western jackdaw (the one we know here in Britain) and the Daurian. which lives in China and Japan, Although different in plumage they are similar in shape, call and behaviour but cannot interbreed.

Historically the jackdaw has been included in

statutes (Henry VIII's anti-vermin 1532 statute) designed to reduce the amount of grain lost to corvids including iackdaws. Parishes of more than 10 families would be fined if they did not maintain baited nets. Yet iackdaws take relatively little grain and have historically not been such highly prized targets as rooks, crows and magpies. Indeed, not so long ago jackdaws would on occasion be used as pets, as were also magpies. This in part is due to their intelligence and the ability, unlike most animals, to be able to identify different humans. They have, like blue tits, been known to remove milk bottle tops on doorsteps which on occasion has led to cases of gastroenteritis amongst humans.

Jackdaws have a healthy, thriving population of around 600,000 in Britain and Ireland and seem to thrive in the modern environment from rubbish tips to motorway service stations. They are also less fearful of danger while other corvids hesitate. Despite the numbers and their

inclination towards the modern world jackdaws do not seem to be that common in London although there are nineteenth century records of these birds inhabiting famous landmarks. When nesting, these birds make heavy work of the structural side of things and will relentlessly continue piling twigs trying to form a foundation. There is one record from Oxenton church in Gloucestershire where a likely nesting location opened up into a larger volume. It must have been created over many years but the eventual 'nest' was 8 feet high and not much narrower at the base! Once the foundation has been established the iackdaw likes to furnish the nest with softer material like feathers, fur and wool. They will often take these materials from live animals and the victims seem more than happy to indulge the iackdaw as these birds do a service of ridding them of parasites.



Chelsfield Village Society AGM - Precis Report

Meeting held on Thursday 2nd November 2023

The Chairman Peter Lamond welcomed all and our MP Gareth Bacon, Mayor Mike Botting, Councillor Angela Page and Superintendent Luke Baldock.

Peter quickly covered the achievements of the society during 2023 including the planting of 300 daffodil bulbs by the new roundabout, a village cleanup, fundraising at the village fair and a coronation party in the village.

Local problems discussed the future. at society meetings included: Power cuts. Bus. and traffic flow problems. Previous minutes were approved, and there were no matters arising. Gareth Bacon said that it was the first time he had been able to join us as our meetings tend to clash with Parliament business. He was happy to take questions about local concerns. He staved on after the meeting to talk about local concerns.

The lead for Neighbourhood Policing Luke Baldock told the audience that Bromley was to get a new Inspector, 4 sergeants and a further 28 PCSOs. There was a need for late night police car patrols. Green Street Green Police Station was to be reopened.

He was questioned about the chats and updates from PCSOs in the past that had been useful, and the response of the police late at night. He said that 59 warnings had been issued to late night racers in the area. CCTV was being used to monitor in the future.

The use of Nitrous Oxide was a big problem, recent legislation should help. Residents should use 999 for emergencies, and 101 for burglaries to contact the Police.

Terry Lloyd covered some of the recent planning issues, including traffic problems along Warren Rd. Local Residents would be canvassed for opinions, and the council contacted for possible solutions.

The treasurer Peter Gandolfi reported our expenses have included -a donation to the Village Newsletter, the planting of 3000 spring bulbs, a Coronation party and a wreath for the Ellis Memorial. Ending up with a balance of £2100. Our auditor Chris was thanked, who agreed to continue in this role.

The committee was re-elected who thanked our Councillors Mike Botting and Angela Page for their outstanding help and service over the past year.

The evening was rounded off with drinks and nibbles and a chance for a chat.

Waldo Road Recycling Centre 4 Day Closure

Essential maintenance at the Waldo Road reuse and recycling centre means that the facility will be closed on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Residents are being asked to postpone their trips to Waldo Road until next week, Monday 4 March, when the site will re-open again following the completion of work, including a repair to a collapsed drain on an approach road within the site. The four day closure is needed to allow time for concrete around the repairs to properly cure. The reuse and recycling centre in

Churchfields Road in Beckenham remains open as normal, which is expected to be busier than normal whilst the Waldo Road site is closed.

Councillor Will Rowlands. Executive Councillor for Environment said. "Recycling and waste collections across the borough are being prioritised, with waste collection vehicles using Waldo Road to access the waste transfer station. where all the borough's waste is initially taken to. The drain collapse has occurred on a road used by the waste collection vehicles, with these

vehicles having to use Waldo Road whilst repairs are made, with the reuse and recycling centre closed during this period."

Following the successful outcome of the repair work, the Waldo Road reuse and recycling centre is anticipated to re-open again on Monday 4 March as normal. Visitors are advised to plan their journey, using the webcams to gauge how busy the site is, especially given it is expected the site will be busier than usual when it re-opens.

Chelsfield Village Society One Way System Vote

Chelsfied Village Society held their first meeting of 2024 on the 6th February, and this issue was discussed at length.

Forty Five houses in Chelsfield Village had received voting forms from CVS to see how residents felt about a one way system from the junction of Chelsfield Lane/Warren Road up to the roundabout at Court Road.

Previously residents from that end of Warren Road had met with Chelsfield Councillors, Mike Botting and Angela Page, and Angus Culverwell, Assistant Director of Traffic and Parking for the London Borough of Bromley. This part of Warren Road is very narrow in places and it is not wide enough for two cars to pass easily, this causes damage to property, emergency services and the R7 bus on occasion cannot get through to the village and it is very dangerous for pedestrians. As a result of that meeting a one way system was discussedit and it was decided that the residents of the village should be asked for their opinions and ideas before Bromley took any action, and that process would be managed by Chelsfield Village Society.

This issue was discussed at the CVS AGM in November with the distribution of forms to follow. Subsequently 45 houses in the village were delivered voting forms, which included a space for their ideas and opinions to be added, along with their vote.

The vote was as follows:

Agreement 12

Disagreement 8

Spoiled Forms 2

No response 23

Whether in agreement or not, it was very interesting feedback, and it was evident that many residents are unhappy and problems exist throughout the village with heavy traffic and parking issues.

These are some of the comments made:

- Consider Warren Road through to Church Road all being one way
- Cars parked just past the bus stop, cause the bus to pull out onto the wrong side of the road to navigate into Church Road
- Generally huge concerns we may lose the bus service, due to the bus being held up constantly
- Large Lorries constantly using Warren & Church Road
- Church Road always congested and jammed with parked cars
- Damage to hedges, footpath and pub car park due to traffic
- Speeding throughout the village not just Warren Road
- Residents of Church Road and parents of school children already having parked cars damaged
- Church Road already does not cope with traffic, the bus regularly gets stuck sometimes cutting the bus out of the route.
- · Damage to walls, driveways and drains by cars

Our Councillors are now handing this information to Angus Culverwell at LBB requesting an official survey of traffic throughput in Chelsfield Village.

Of course all this takes time and CVS will keep you informed as to progress

Rob's Ramblings - Honours - It's only my opinion but...

The recent ITV drama about the Post Office scandal gave some fascinating, and depressing, insights into the way the Post Office was run. what victims had to endure and how difficult it was for them to begin to get some form of justice. It also revealed the power of TV dramas to bring scandals to our attention resulting in members of the "public" pressing for action. I wonder why the BBC's Panorama documentary on the same subject, aired in 2015, did not provoke the same response. Maybe the previous programme had concentrated on too many stark facts (but it was a documentary) and too little on the personal tragedies (but it wasn't a drama). although several victims did feature in that programme. Do you think actors in dramas, in which events may be changed, even if only slightly for presentational purposes, have more influence on us than the bald truth of unadulterated facts?

Who knows why a story can fail to capture our outrage in one moment but in another motivate us into such strong action that we demand changes in the law and in society? Most of us know what would cause us to act for ourselves or our families but what is it that prompts us to feel compelled to take

action to help people we have never met or don't know? The alleged behaviour of the Post Office's former Chief Executive implicated in the scandal. Paula Vennels and some of her co-workers. suggest that, in her case anyway due to her being an ordained priest, stopping negative things happening to people when she could have helped them has nothing to do with the oft referred to usual suspects - God and religion. I'm sure most of us think we know of scandals that have affected individuals, and even groups of people, but that have never been examined by a wider "public" due to not capturing the imaginations of TV or the press or of people not directly involved.

Once driven to action the potential power of people. that's us by the way, was revealed in the on-line petition demanding action to withdraw the honour awarded to Mrs Vennells in 2019. Reportedly, the petition collected over 1 million signatures which was a number far too big to be ignored by politicians and others who try, and often succeed, in guiding our society, whether we like it or not. This demand for action contrasts with the longstanding quiet from most of those politicians who had been given hints of the

scandal in the past, including at least one former Prime Minister. It also contrasts with current members of the Cabinet Office Honours Committee whose predecessors had originally vetted Mrs Vennells' nomination and then approved the CBE she was awarded.

Maybe the previous members of the Committee hadn't noticed, or had chosen not to notice, that at the same time they were giving her a positive vetting her time at the Post Office was coming to an end and she was feeling compelled to resign. Surely Committee members couldn't have been that out of touch or have had such poor systems of intelligence gathering that the brewing scandal was missed? But then again, Mrs Vennells was immediately appointed to the Board of an NHS Trust and offered other Board appointments in the private sector so maybe there's an endemic failure to adequately look beyond personal friendships.

Everyone makes mistakes, and we grow by learning from our own and other people's, and the most important lesson from mistakes is what is done when a mistake is discovered. Once it was realised by current Honours Committee members that



there had been a mistake. albeit by previous members, the silence they generated was deafening. Did they hope no one would realise that such an inditement of the honours system by not announcing a review of that particular award, will damage the value of future awards for as long as that silence is remembered? I think Mr Bates did a far more honourable thing by declining the offer of an award because Mrs Vennells was allowed to retain hers without, initially. the appropriate questions being asked. However, I'd like to think it wasn't just the number of signatures on the petition, but, maybe, a dawning awareness of what she had actually done and the extent of her mistake. that resulted in Mrs Vennells returning her CBE. (I know inferences to be drawn from the delay in her returning the award and in the wording of her apology do not necessarily endorse this view but try to think positive about her as a human being!)

Did Honours Committee

members not understand that, for the rest of us. inactivity such as theirs actually devalues the honours that people have already received? In the past, when there have been similar breaches of expected and of, by implication from having received an award. behaviour portrayed as model behaviour, has led to some honours being returned. Don't get me wrong, I'm not knocking the honours system because I think, in a different form, the arrangement has a place. However, the current system for nominating, influencing and vetting honours appears to be heavily tainted and more so now with this recent revelation. (At this point I should declare a vested interest and that my father once featured in the Queen's Birthday Honours list, rightly, I think.

However, compare the behaviour of Mrs Vennels with that of Jeffery Archer, a convicted criminal who served a prison sentence, who still sits in the House of Lords. There were, and are, no newspaper or TV hints

Mr Archer thought for about surrendering his honour. An honour that appears, to me in my ignorance of detail, to have been given partly because his pals thought well of him and he had influence. Retaining his honour may not be regarded as too important to some people but we should remember that members of the House of Lords help to set and change laws that apply to us all. I wonder what other Lords and Ladies think about that. Perhaps. the "public" have not been motivated to collective action, or perhaps our individually expressed views count for little, other than in exceptional situations highlighted by TV or the press?

Do you think we should all be more active in speaking out about what we think is bad (and good, because that's just as important)? Maybe we should turn the "public" into a kind of "action re-public" and try to remove things that damage our communities and the wider society those communities form?

Chelsfield Casualties of World War II

6097682 Corporal Frederick Thomas Parrott was a member of the 6th Battalion of the Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment. He died on 26 March 1944, eighty years ago this month, aged 30 and is buried at the Cassino War Cemetery in In trying to find out more Italy, and remembered on information about him, I the war memorial in our church porch.

According to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission records he was the son of George and Elizabeth Beatrice Parrott, and the husband of Elizabeth Parrott of Halstead.

found the birth of a 'Frederick T Parrott' was

registered in 1913 in the Sevenoaks district, with the mother's maiden name Hills, and a 'Frederick T Parrott' married Elizabeth Jones in 1937 in the Bromley district. On the September 1939 National Register there is a Fred T and Elizabeth Parrott living in Johnsons Avenue, Sevenoaks, As



Johnson's Road is actually in Badgers Mount, and this Fred's birth date is given as 20th August 1913, it looks quite likely that this is 'our' Frederick and his wife. At this point he is a road labourer working for Kent County Council.

The Army Enlistment
Register shows that
Frederick Parrott signed
up to the Royal West
Surrey Regiment on 20th
June 1940 but transferred
to the Royal West Kents
on 2nd October. His
battalion, the 6th
Battalion of the Royal
West Kent regiment, were
involved in the Italian
campaign for most of its

duration. They took part in the Moro River Campaign, the Battle of Monte Cassino, the fighting around the Gothic Line and the final offensive in April 1945. Parrott was killed during the Battle of Monte Cassino and the Army Casualty Lists for 10 April to 4 May 1944 show that he was one of 12 men in his battalion to die on the same day. On the Wikipedia page for the Regiment, there is a photograph of men from that battalion manning a 3-inch mortar on Monastery Hill, Monte Cassino, Italy, on the day Frederick died.

In 1911 Frederick Parrott's parents George and Elizabeth were living at 'The Retreat', Well Hill, and George was working as a farm labourer. In 1939 they are still living in the area but have moved to 'Poplars'. The epitaph on Frederick's official Commonwealth War Grave headstone in Italy reads 'Who gave his life for peace on earth and good will to all men'. perhaps a fitting tribute to be reminded of at this Eastertide.

Stop and Search Charter - Survey

Further to our letter in January, I am writing with both an update on the Stop and Search Charter and a request for you to complete and publicise our survey amongst the community.

Our New Met for London plan committed to developing a **Stop and Search Charter** setting out <u>how</u>, and when stop and search should be used and provide greater transparency on the tactic. The Charter is being developed in partnership with Londoners as part of our work to rebuild trust and confidence.

Over the last six months we have carried out significant community engagement, asking Londoners for their views on how stop and search should be; carried out, audited, scrutinised and governed and how we should work with communities going forward to ensure their views are heard. We have focused consultation on those groups most likely to be affected by stop and search, including young people and those from a minority background, through a combination of locally run events on each borough and thematic events at New Scotland Yard and online. Key themes from the events have included:

- Focusing on the quality of the encounter
- Improved supervision
- Improved training
- Improved complaints handling
- Better use of technology
- Enhanced independent governance and scrutiny
- Community involvement in where, when and why S+S is being used
- Better public understanding of S+S

In addition we have completed two quantitative surveys

- A YouGov survey, focusing on a representative sample of London
- A survey carried out by Zen-City, which surveys a wide range of people who have highlighted an interest in stop and search.

I am seeking your support to both complete and publicise the next and final stage of our research programme, which is open to everybody who lives and works in London. This will test the themes already identified by those interested in stop and search with the wider public.

Findings from the survey and consultation will be used to co-create the Stop and Search Charter, putting community voices front and centre. The Charter will be pivotal to improving trust, transparency and accountability with London communities and we plan to launch this with a communications and engagement programme in <u>Spring</u>.
