## Minutes of Chelsfield Village Society AGM 2010

10th November 2010, Parish Room, 7.30 pm

### Apologies for absence.

These were received from Dave Griffiths, David Lambert, Dan Sloan, Philip Lane and Cllr. Samaris Huntington-Thresher. The meeting was also attended by Cllrs. Julian Grainger and Russell Jackson.

### Minutes of 2009 AGM.

Catherine said these had been circulated in the Village Voice shortly after the meeting and had received no comment. She offered to read them out but it was agreed that this was not necessary. Acceptance of the minutes was approved - proposed by Denis Graham and seconded by Janet Parsons.

### Chairman's Report.

Pam welcomed all those present and thanked them for coming. She apologised for the last minute change of venue caused by Catherine's brainstorm. Pam introduced our new councillor, Russell Jackson.

Pam said that she was elected Chairman after the 2009 AGM and since then the committee has met

regularly. We have the monthly Village Voice which has been well received. Comments and articles should be sent to Dan Sloan (details in VV). The Village Fair was again a great success and our thanks go to Alan Johnson and James Hummerson who collected bottles for the bottle stall and raised £300 for the CVS. Thanks to everyone who contributed bottles.

Japanese knotweed has been found on the edge of the Koi Barn land and is being dealt with.

It has been decided to replace the Church and Village noticeboards (which are in a poor state) with one board clearly divided in half. James Hummerson is preparing a design and the cost will be approximately £300. The PCC have agreed to share the cost with the CVs and Jeremy Binns has kindly offered to make a contribution in memory of Janet who did so much for the village. A plaque in memory of Janet is to be included above the CVS board.

British Telecom is to include the Orpington ex-

change in their fibre optic roll out so we should be able to enjoy fast Internet access by Autumn 2011.

Pam said most importantly, road safety and traffic problems is her hobby horse. Since January the Committee has had lengthy discussions with our Ward Councillors regarding the speeding traffic, large lorries through Chelsfield Lane and the Village and parking issues. Progress has been very slow but at last we are getting somewhere. We have a display of the mark 2 versions of our "wish list" and your comments are invited. However even these are subject to amendment as they do not fully meet our requirements. We have been allocated a budget of just over £17000 and we want to make the best use of this money.

The Council has advised us to deal with the matter of a village car park as a separate issue and we have agreed and will pursue this. Also we have a suggested scheme for the dangerous Court Road/Warren Road junction which we are considering and will implement for now



and look in more detail at making possible major changes to the junction which I think are needed. Pam thanked committee and our councillors for the hours they have spent throughout the year on this issue. During the Chairman's report Cllr. Grainger spoke about the proposed response to our wish list and invited members to view the plans and comment. Plans for the proposed improvements to the Court Road/Warren Road junction were circulated. He said that the provision of a roundabout there was a definite possibility in the long term.

Finally Pam was approached by Tony Pitham, owner of the Koi Barn, to meet him and discuss his plans for building 6-8 houses on the Koi barn site. He held a meeting in the Five Bells on the 20<sup>th</sup> October for residents to view and discuss his plans. James Hummerson will keep an eye out for any planning applications received. Otherwise there is little point in getting involved in a discussion until we receive a definite proposal. As you know, Tony is very good at changing his mind.

Pam reminded the meeting that there will be a village

party in the Brass Crosby Room on 22<sup>nd</sup> December. There will be a raffle to raise funds. Please bring a plate of food and some drink to share.

### **Treasurer's report.**

Firstly Catherine gave a couple of facts:

Membership is the highest since 1996 and the balance is the lowest since 1991.

In the past we have made large donations supporting village projects and activities. Some of these were:

The village sign, £1000; the village pond, £230; the Village Hall clock, £100;

the Village Hall, £1750; the Brass Crosby blue plaque event, £640 and

the Golden Jubilee celebrations, £530 – both of these last two being in the same year.

We no longer have the funds to provide this sort of support.

Catherine pointed out from the accounts that there were two major areas of expenditure. Hall hire includes hire for Show and the Internet Café. The Internet Café is also responsible for almost all the donations that result in the project covering its own costs.

Printing costs are mainly for the Village Voice. The Editor, Dan Sloan, prints the copies at a very reasonable price. We are very grateful to have the opportunity to make use of this newsletter that helps us to fulfill our aim to communicate with all residents. It also brings the village together, inviting contributions from all groups and individuals.

Thanks go again to Alan and James who organised the bottle tombola at the Summer Fair. Our end of year balance is about £170 less than last year. We need to take an active role in fund raising at local events to support the Village Society's running costs, in particular the monthly newsletter. It was agreed we should have a stall at the St Martin's Fete.

Catherine thanked Chris Parsons for auditing the accounts. She invited him to act again as auditor for next year. His appointment was approved - nominated by Melanie Stevens and seconded by Janet Parsons.

There were no questions about the accounts.

### **Nominations and election of committee**

The existing committee members: Pam Ames, Joy Ellard, Catherine Gandolfi, James Hummerson, Alan Johnson, David Lambert, Dan Sloan, Terry Sparkes, Melanie Stevens and Bridget O'Donnell were all willing to stand again. There being no further nominations or objections the committee was elected en bloc. Proposed by Peter Gandolfi and seconded by Janet Parsons.

### **Any other business.**

Anne Mead gave several dates of events which she was asked to send to Dan Sloan for inclusion in the Village Voice diary.

Helen Griffiths complained that vegetation needed

cutting back as it was obscuring a street light. Cllr. Grainger pointed her towards the council web site where such problems could be reported. The Millers of Court Lodge Farm said that they have a continual battle with fly tippers and have to bear the cost of removal themselves. Cllr. Grainger gave them details of who they may be able to contact for advice or help.

Discussions about the “wish list” proposals continued during the refreshments.

Alan Ames of Eagle Heights arrived with Alaska, an American bald eagle, an enormous bird for such a small room. She was unable to fly in such a

confined space. He answered many questions. Cllr. Jackson took a turn at holding Alaska perched on the glove. She is not as heavy as she looks. It was way past her bed time so Alan returned her to her perch in his van and brought in Doris the 3 month old barn owl. She spent some time perched on Melanie's and then Catherine's wrists. We learned that she was originally called Boris until her gender became clear. Barn owls bred at Eagle Heights have been released into the wild in the area.

To round off the evening a free raffle was held, everyone having been given a free ticket.

## Local History Group Report

Paul Rason introduced this month's meeting with an extract from "This Week" a magazine of news clippings. A headmaster ate a tarantula in front of a school assembly as a fund raising stunt. Some pupils were reported to be upset by this antic and a parent was quoted as saying "In Orpington we don't do things like that". The headmaster was Mr Onac and the school was St Olave's.

Paul went on to say that he had recently showed the head teacher of Chelsfield Primary School, Patrick Foley, a disc with transcriptions of the school's log book. This dates from 1980 when there was a request for London Borough of Bromley publications of information from 100 years ago. The log books from 1883-1892 and 1892-1906 were transcribed. Paul received copies 10 years ago and gave a U3A talk on the subject. Volunteers were recruited to type up the log books

and transfer the information to discs. The results were printed and spirally bound.

Mr Foley has all the school log books, the earliest dating from 1865. The front of each book describes how they are to be used. They are used to record the more unusual happenings such as visitors – usually the local vicar in the early days.

It cost 1d a week to send a child to school and many entries concern children being sent home to get the money. Mr Waring, the local squire, visited often. As a JP he was used as a "correspondent" checking on behalf of the school inspectorate. Mr Waring's four daughters all worked in the school on a voluntary basis, the whole family thinking of it as "their school." Most of the children were the offspring of agricultural labourers and bad behaviour was reported to Mr Waring who reprimanded the children.

The long summer breaks were established because of the need for children to help with harvest which brought in much needed money. Any royal celebrations also resulted in school holidays. In 1887 the school was closed for a week to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee. The school was lit by oil lamps and the hours depended on the hours of daylight as lighting the lamps cost money.

Paul circulated copies of the transcriptions. Poor attendance was a perennial problem. Much of this was caused by illness but particularly during the fruit and hop picking seasons children were kept away to help on the local farms. The opening of a new school in Pratts Bottom resulted in the loss of 40 children at once, quite a blow to a school depending on numbers attending.

Measles, whooping cough, diphtheria and scarlet fever all featured regularly, the log book showing that the school

was closed for three weeks during a measles epidemic by the sanitary inspector. The school took as many as 140 children in 2 classrooms so illness spread readily. In January 1884 there were several deaths from croup attributed to overcrowding and draughts. The following March diphtheria was rife and the medical officer again contemplated closing the school. Enlargement of the school and better ventilation was recommended. The current maximum roll is 115 with 4 classrooms, but is currently 85 with another 10 joining the infants after Christmas.

Bad weather affected attendance as many children had to walk several

miles to and from school. A case of physical abuse of children was noted, the perpetrator being taken to court and fined 10 shillings and costs. One parent removed her children from school because "the headmaster had occasion to punish her son for teaching insubordination to other boys". Three children were absent with St Vitus dance in 1886. In 1887 there were 50 children in a classroom designed for 30 and fainting and sickness were common. Other mass absences were due to fireworks displays, teas, and Sunday School treats.

Copies of the registers were also circulated from 1895. Attendance was

free by then, having been introduced on 1<sup>st</sup> September 1891 and children as young as 3 were sent to the school. Scholarships were proudly noted but not always taken up because of the expense and difficulty of transport.

The log books dating from the First World War show that many boys were involved in scouting duties guarding telegraph wires.

This talk was a pertinent introduction to the schools history, as we have now obtained a copy of Carol Margetts history of Chelsfield Village School, and after it has been converted into computer text, will be serialised
