The Chelsfield Photo Show is Coming to Town Again

Local History Group

This months meeting consisted of a discussion on the Battle of Britain, and the part Biggin Hill played in it.

Paul Rason opened the meeting by introducing Sue Short and mentioned her new book about Pratts Bottom which is due out in October.

Paul started by playing 'The Fugue'; from William Walton's Spitfire Prelude and Fugue and asked the audience what was it and its relevance to this meeting. This was of course because it was Battle of Britain week and the 15th of October which was the day before the meeting, was the accepted date for the turning point of the battle, and now thought of as Battle of Britain Day. He then produced copies of the War Diaries for each of the Squadrons that were at Biggin Hill during the Battle, which was from July to end of October 1940. These were handed out so that the audience could read the daily

accounts of the squadrons. Paul gave some background on overall plan of Fighter command under Air Chief Marshal Dowding, who aimed to prolong the battle as long as possible into the winter months by which time the enemy could not safely contemplate an invasion across the English Channel in bad weather.

Biggin Hill station is not far away, and local people would have been aware of the young airmen and the adventures surrounding them. Biggin Hill was billed (although perhaps later) as the most famous fighter station of WW2, in part because the Prime Minister Mr Churchill visited it several times, as did the King, General De Gaulle and top brass of the RAF etc. But mainly because it was a very active action station in the front line of the battle to control the skies over London, Kent and Sussex with over 1000 enemy aircraft claimed as shot down during WW2.

Amongst the famous flyers based there at one time or another were Squadron Leader 'Sailor' Malan, a top scoring pilot, Stamford Tuck, a well know flver of the time and John Mungo Park etc who has a road named after him off the St Marv Cray end of Chelsfield Lane. Although he survived the battle he did not survive the war. Paul also handed out some books of his on the Battle of Britain and the RAF in general, and spoke about these. His photographs of The Battle of Britain Memorial, which is on the Embankment near Big Ben, and was unveiled in 2005 were also made available. Questions were taken about what had been discussed followed by refreshments.

Geoff Copus will be speaking at next month's local history meeting on some of his recent findings on archives of the area of Chelsfield and its environs. This will be held on Thursday 15th October at 10.15 in the Brass Crosby room next to the church.

A History of Chelsfield Village Post Office

At a later time, the Post Office moved once more to one of the nearby Rock Cottages (No. 1 Rock Cottages) and next door but one to a lady called Miss Veralls (No. 3 Rock Cottages). A long established business at No. 3 run by Miss Veralls provided saddles, harnesses, and leather items to meet the requirements of the many horses still used at that

time for a multitude of working purposes. My Grandmother (Mrs Sophia Margetts at The Lodge) remembered the period when horses used to be taken through the front of No. 3 Rock Cottages from the Village street into the back of the cottage for the fitting of saddles etc. Miss Veralls had a companion who lived next door at No. 2 Rock Cottages. This lady was called Miss Greenslade, and she also had a sister living there with her who was mentally retarded. The cottage at No.1 which was used as the Post Office was occupied in later years by Mr & Mrs Divall and their three children called Harry, "Tibby" and Helen.

Whilst located at No. 1 Rock Cottages, the Post Office was run by Mr Stacey who was the Post-

master. After a time Mr Stacev moved the Post Office back to Crosshall it's original location. and carried on running it for a considerable period. In due course Mr Stacey died, but the Post Office continued to be run by his daughter and her husband – Mr and Mrs Smith. The Post Office with Mrs Smith in charge was run at Crosshall until 1938, and then moved across the road to nearby Cross House. Several years later Mr Bert Smith died and following this unfortunate event Mrs Smith gave up the Post Office and moved away from Chelsfield to live with her daughter Margaret.

A number of older Chelsfield residents remember Mrs Smith with great affection albeit they were still at school during that period. Mrs Smith was apparently very patient when children ventured into the Post Office to buy sweets from the tempting and attractive range set out in trays along the counter. In the course of choosing, there were naturally many changes of mind which Mrs Smith took in her stride on such occasions.

Following on from Mrs Smith, the Post Office at Cross House was taken over around 1940 by Mr & Mrs Beeson, they were also assisted in this task by their daughter whose husband was serving in the RAF. Tragically he was killed during the wartime hostilities and following this event Mr & Mrs Beeson and their daughter moved away from Chelsfield.

The running of the Post Office at Cross House was taken over during the war by Mr & Mrs Humpherson with Mrs Humpherson as the Post Mistress, Mr & Mrs Humpherson continued to live at Cross House from around 1940 until 1059. Whilst Mrs Humpherson ran the Post Office services. Mr Humpherson carried on working as a self employed Photographer. During the war, Mr Humpherson was also a member of the Civil Defence Force and can be identified in the wartime group photograph of Civil Defence members taken over on the recreation ground by the hut.

Mr Humpherson was an extremely talented photographer and there are many views of the Chelsfield area taken during the 1950's which are examples of his work - especially the snow scenes at various times and locations. Many family albums (like our own) also have photographs of family members taken by Mr Humpherson during the period when he lived and worked in Chelsfield. These include babies and young children, parents and grandparents as well as wedding photographs etc.

There are many examples of Mr Humpherson's work in Philip Lane's extensive collection. I think it can be said quite fairly that Mr Humpherson was Philip Lane's predecessor in terms of being well known for his photographic work in Chelsfield but I will leave any

more comments to Philip's more expert knowledge of his achievements. I hope that readers will forgive me for this diaression from the Post Office history as such, but Mr Humpherson did contribute greatly to our memories of Chelsfield through his work and this is an excellent opportunity to give him a little of the praise he undoubtedly deserves.

Mrs Humpherson ran the Post Office at Cross House for nearly 20 vears as Post Mistress with help throughout this period from Mrs Pat Whitehead who also assisted at times in the private part of the house in a domestic capacity.

Without wishing to sound in any way unkind, Mrs Humpherson did not always get along well with some of her customers as did her predecessor Mrs Smith, However this was not always the case since I know that my Grandmother (Mrs Margetts at the Lodge) got along fine with Mrs

Humpherson but many other residents had 'brushes' with Mrs Humpherson from time to time.

I have to admit that during the early 1950's my own recollections of the Post Office with Mrs Humpherson in charge begin. During this period (and in the years just before the 1939/45 war) the range of services offered by the Post Office began to expand from being predominantly just mail collections/deliveries and telegrams into other areas. These new service included the Post Office National Savings Bank (Post Office Book). National Saving Certificates (which at that time could be purchased over the counter and stuck in the holder's personal book), Postal/Money Orders and Premium Bonds.

With the development of the Welfare Services after the War, the Post Office became the port of call in order to collect the weekly Old Age Pension through the Pension Book or Child Allowance

(then only paid for the second child onwards). The arrival of the television (BBC first and then later ITV) saw the introduction of the annual TV licence which was purchased at the Post Office: whilst on the subject of licences there was also the Dog Licence which dutiful citizens were expected to purchase. A form could be obtained also for the purchase or renewal of the Vehicle Driving Licence but this then had to be forwarded to the appropriate address to complete the process. All in all, the Post Office became a very busy centre of activity in this era with many new transitions as lives became more complicated or sophisticated according to your point of view.
