A wild plant that recently came to my notice is the Sun Spurge (Euphorbia helioscopia). I noticed it while taking a rest in woodland while on a walk around the Shoreham lane area and it struck me as a plant with an interesting flower head. Indeed it gets its name from its flower head which 'stares' at the sun (helioscopia) while the name Euphorbia is derived from a 1st century AD, Mauretanian king by the name of Euphorbus who used it for medicinal purposes in North Africa. But why a 1st century king would be spending his time healing the sick is difficult to fathom !

The plant, flower included, is entirely green so it is not the prettiest plant you will ever see but the flower head consists of oval bracts that surround the flower in an peculiar manner (see photo). The flowers bloom between April and October and once done with the job of seed dispersal the plant rapidly withers to a crip brown. However, the process of seed dispersal is

in itself interesting, As the seed head drys in the summer sun the three separate seed capsules split open with an audible crack and fire the seeds some distance from the mother plant. However an additional means of dispersal is afforded with the help of ants which bly in or near the ants nest.

As mentioned previously the plant has medicinal uses. The sap, which flows easily when the stalk is damaged, is a white latex like fluid which is in itself poisonous. However, during the first half of the 20th cen-



are attracted by a fleshy oil capsule attached to the seed head. The ants carry the seed away to consume the oil and leave the seed, presumatury this fluid would be used as a county-lore solution to warts. The belief was that the fluid, which would dry to a solid latex like consistency,



would suffocate the wart – I didn't realise they even breathed ! Other medicinal uses include the treatment of eczema although this appears to be popular in Scandinavia rather than Britian. Since noticing this plant on a walk some months ago I have seen it quite frequently – including in my garden where it had presumably been living happily unnoticed for many years.

Lilly's Farm Proposal - an Objection

In the September issue of Chelsfield Village Voice vou will have read the article relating to the proposed development at Lilly's Farm. I would like to take this opportunity to state my own opinion of this, or any similar proposed developments in our Conservation Area.

I wrote to the London Borough of Bromley to express my total and

absolute objection to the proposed development.

This is a conservation area and is green belt. The land is a small holding and has always been. A small holding is a perfectly acceptable use of land within a conservation area and the character with other Green Belt. This application is to completely change the use of the land, precisely what the

Conservation Areas and Green Belt were set up to protect. It is of little concern to me that the footprint of the proposal has been manipulated to permit more dwellings. It is of little concern to me that the design of the buildings are totally out of surrounding buildings. It is of little concern to me that the style of building is not a traditional Kentish



style. Agreed, these are all individual, yet very important arguments against this particular proposal, but in my opinion the whole point is that this type of development does not belong, and should not even be considered within Chelsfield Village.

To accept this application, even with conditions, would be a dereliction of duty by the London Borough of Bromley. I have no objection whatsoever to the owner using the land profitably, as long as the proposed use is 100% sympathetic to the principles of Conservation Areas and The Green Belt.

Furthermore, the "example" given on the website, of a similar application, and also cited by Mr Pitham's Planning Adviser is much less dense and on a much larger site (10 houses on 2.9 hectares) and Green Belt, NOT a Conservation Area. A comparable density on this site would be two houses. Consequently it is quite ridiculous to use a application such as this as a model!

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH "BE BREAST AWARE THIS OCTOBER"

This October medial consultants at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital are supporting Breast Cancer Awareness Month and advising local residents to wise up to the facts, and become breast aware. Every year 12,000[i] people die from the disease and a recent survey commissioned by BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital found that in Bromley, 71 per cent of people had either suffered from. or knew someone who

had been affected by breast cancer.

The hospital and consultant's commitment to the campaign aim to highlight some key facts about the disease. The number of people being diagnosed with breast cancer, which affects both men and women, is increasing. Each year around 50,000[ii] people are diagnosed with the disease and this October, 4,000[iii] people will receive the devastating news that they have breast cancer.

The research, by BMI Chelsfield Park hospital, worryingly found that despite high profile campaigns, 43 per cent of residents in Bromley still believe that most women who are diagnosed with breast cancer, have a family history or a genetic predisposition to the disease. "This is just not true." commented Consultant Reconstructive Breast Surgeon, Mr Anil Desai at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital. "Most people who develop breast cancer do not have abnormal genes or any prior family history of the disease. That is why breast awareness and these campaigns are so vitally important."



Mr Desai and his consultant colleagues at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital are concerned for the wellbeing of Bromley residents, and are urging them to brush up on the facts surrounding breast cancer, become breast aware and take control of their breast health. Commenting on the

"Breast cancer is typically painless and therefore one may not become aware of a change in the breast unless you examine it. The best time for

awareness campaign, Mr Desai continued: "There is no right or wrong way to check your breasts. It is important to know what is normal for you through regular self-examination. Looking for changes in the mirror with the arms

breast self-examination is a week or two after a period. A lump or change in texture at such a time in pre-menopausal women or at any time in postmenopausal women should be regarded with suspicion. The more

aware people are aware, the more lives we can save "

BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital advise that women should see their GP if they are notice any of the following symptoms during their breast check:

- Painless lumps in the breast
- Changes in the size or shape of a breast
- Dimpling to the skin of the breast
- Thickened breast tissue
- Nipple inversion
- Lump or thickening behind the nipple
- Rash affecting the nipple
- Blood-stained discharge from the nipple
- Swelling or a lump in the armpit.

Breast cancer affects both men and women and is the most common form of cancer in the UK. Each year around 300 men and 49,000[iv] women are diagnosed with the disease. Commenting on the awareness campaign Ruth Hoadley Executive Director at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital



commented: "The awareness campaign organised by our consultants at BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital will hopefully drive home the message that everyone should be aware of their body and act quickly if they find anything outside of their normal boundaries. As our research has shown, breast cancer is a disease that affects so many people and it is vitally important that both men and women take control of their health.

"Across the course of their life, every woman in the UK will have a one in eight chance of developing the disease. While the disease in men is less common, the mortality rate is higher because of the lack of awareness around the disease.

"However, with early diagnosis and intervention both men and women can make the first positive steps to increase their chances of successful treatment. That is why if you suspect or notice a lump or change in your breast it is imperative you visit your GP straight away," Ruth concluded.

BMI Chelsfield Park Hospital offers rapid diagnosis through its one-stop clinics. All types of breast cancer surgery are carried out it in its wellequipped theatres including intraoperative sentinel lymph node analysis. In addition, chemotherapy is also given in a dedicated suite. Breast Cancer Facts:

• The number of people being diagnosed with breast cancer is increasing, but the good news is survival rates are improving. This is probably because of more targeted treatments, earlier detection and better breast awareness.

- The biggest risk factor, after gender, is increasing age – 80% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50, the highest incidence being in the 70-80 year olds.
- Breast cancer also affects men, but it's rare – around 300 men are diagnosed each year.
- Breast cancer is not one single disease there are several types of breast cancer.
- Not all breast cancers show as a lump, and not all breast lumps are breast cancer.
- Less than 10% of breast cancer runs in families, so having someone in your family with breast cancer doesn't necessarily mean your own risk is increased.

4....Always check who is at the back door and do not open it if you feel anxious.

5....Close and lock all your doors and windows, even if you are only going out for a few minutes.

6....Keep your valuables

out of sight.

Leave some lights on if it will be dark before

8....Fit a mortice lock to your front door and other external doors. Consider installing a burglar alarm.

9....Always keep sheds and outhouses locked.

10....Cancel milk or other deliveries if you will be away for days or weeks at a time.

They appeared to be either enticing the residents of these nests out, or saying goodbye to their old homes. Within an hour or so all were oone and all was quiet until next year. I have

Chelsfield 10K Fun Run

The second ever Out'n'about Chelsfield 10k and fun day, took place on Sunday 16th September. Dry yet cloudy weather made good running conditions for the 75 runners who were mostly from the local community, although some had travelled from as far afield as Buckinghamshire. They were treated to an undulating course through pretty woods and fields and at one point the excitement of the high level foot bridge that crosses the M25 . Local History Group

September's guest speaker was Pamela Zolliker who gave us a talk entitled "The Secret Hidden in the Hills" about local involvement with the war effort. Most if us were unaware that a verv important WWII wireless listening, or Y, station was located in Knockholt at Ivy Farm. The site was requisitioned opened in May 1942 and was expanded to 160 acres in the July. The location was chosen at the highest point in the highest village in Kent. The rhombic aerial was located on the high plateau at 725 feet.

This Radio Intercept Station picked up for the non-Morse encrypted teleprinter traffic, known as Fish and sent them to be decoded at Bletchlev Park, known as Station X. These communications were between German High Command and the German army throughout Europe. The 118 staff were stationed in single story huts and their work lead to the decryption of the messages at Bletchley park using the Colossus machine, developed in 1943.

Pamela recommended the exhibition currently

running at the Science Museum

"Codebreaker:Alan Turing's Life and Legacy". This area is likely to be revisited in the future after more research.

After refreshments Paul Rason showed us his daughter's Paralympics Gamesmaker volunteer's kit and mementos.
